



## **Guide for Authors**

### ***Description***

Ocean and Coastal Journal is a national and international journal published on two times per year dedicated to the study of all aspects of ocean and coastal at international, national, regional, and local levels. Scope of Journal: a) Marine conservation; b) Fisheries management; c) Social Ecological System; d) Marine spatial planning; e) Marine pollution; f) Climate change. Based on SK. PDII No. 0005.25498223/JI.3.1/SK.ISSN/2017.03 (March 8, 2017), Coastal and Ocean Journal has been registered in the ISSN online, with the electronic number ISSN 2549-8233.

### ***General Requirements***

Manuscript sent to editorial COJ must follow the writing guidelines with an editable file of the entire article. Manuscripts that do not accordance with the guidelines will be returned for revision before scientific review.

### ***Language***

Manuscript can be written in Indonesian or English Language. Manuscript with the English Language has been 'spell checked' and 'grammar checked'. Authors who are unsure of correct Indonesia or English usage should have their manuscript checked by someone proficient in the language. Manuscripts in which the Indonesia or English is difficult to understand may be returned to the author for revision before scientific review.

### ***Types of paper***

- Research Articles: Original and unpublished work e.g. controlled trials, intervention studied, studies of screening and diagnostic test, cost effectiveness analyses, case-control series, and surveys or monitoring program. Generally, manuscripts should not exceed 8,000 words, the maximum word length being 10,000 can be accepted after consultation with Editor-in-Chief. The length of a paper should be commensurate with the scientific information being reported. In particular, the introductory material should be limited to a few paragraphs and results presented in figures should not be repeated in tables.
- Short Communication: A brief communication of urgent matter or the reporting of preliminary findings to be given expedited publication. Maximum 4000 words excluding references and abstract and up to 10 references.



- 37 • Review papers: Critical assessments of literature and data sources. Those wishing to  
38 prepare a review should first consult the Editors or Associate Editors concerning  
39 acceptability of topic and length.
- 40 • Special Issues. Series seminar, proceedings of symposia, workshops and/or conferences  
41 will be considered for publication as a special issue.

### 43 ***Manuscript Guidelines***

- 44 • The length manuscript from "title" to "references", a maximum of 10 pages, 1,5 spaced,  
45 paper size A4, one column, use a right and left margin of 2,5 cm, top and bottom margin  
46 of 3 cm;
- 47 • Articles written in Indonesian or English Language with MS-Word, with font text using  
48 Cambria with size 12 pt. (except the abstract with size 11 pt., and affiliation with size 9  
49 pt.);
- 50 • The articles structure consist of:
- 51 1) Title (no more than 20 word)
- 52 2) Author names and affiliations (without degree)
- 53 3) The full address and correspondence email agencies of authors
- 54 4) Abstract in english and Indonesia
- 55 5) Introduction (background and purpose)
- 56 6) Material and Methods
- 57 7) Results and Discussion
- 58 8) Conclusions
- 59 9) Acknowledgements
- 60 10) References.

### 62 ***Article Processing Fees***

63 Manuscript that is sent to the editorial office is free of charge. Publication fee borne by  
64 the publisher, and the publication is only in the electronic journal (if the author wants the  
65 journal printing, fee is payable by authors or on their behalf).

67 **ARTICLES STRUCTURE FOR AUTHORS**

68 **TITLE:** Concise and informative. Avoid abbreviations and formulae where possible. No  
69 more than 20 words. (Examples in Appendix 1 and 2)

70  
71 **Author Names and Affiliations:** Where the family name may be ambiguous (e.g., a double  
72 name), please indicate this clearly. Present the authors' affiliation addresses (where the  
73 actual work was done) below the names. Indicate all affiliations with a lower-case  
74 superscript letter immediately after the author's name and in front of the appropriate  
75 address. Provide the full postal address of each affiliation, including the country name and,  
76 if available, the e-mail address of each author. Please indicate the corresponding author  
77 who will handle correspondence at all stages of refereeing and publication, also post-  
78 publication. (Example in Appendix 2)

100 A concise and factual abstract is required. The abstract should state briefly the purpose of the  
101 research, methodology, the principal results and major conclusions. An abstract is often presented  
102 separately from the article, so it must be able to stand alone. For this reason, References should be  
103 avoided, but if essential, then cite the author(s) and year(s). Also, non-standard or uncommon  
104 abbreviations should be avoided, but if essential they must be defined at their first mention in the  
105 abstract itself. No more than 250 words. (size 11pt and 1 space) } 2 space

106  
107 **Keywords:** Immediately after the abstract, provide a maximum of 5 keywords, general and plural  
108 terms should be avoided. (size 11pt and 1 space) } 3 space

111 **1. Introduction**

112 <sup>1 cm</sup> → State the objectives of the work and provide an adequate background, avoiding a  
113 detailed literature survey or a summary of the results. } 3 space

114  
115 **2. Material and methods**

116 Provide sufficient detail to allow the work to be reproduced. Methods already published  
117 should be indicated by a reference: only relevant modifications should be described.

118 **3. Results and Discussion**

119 Results should be clear and concise. Discussion should explore the significance of the research  
120 work while extensive citations and discussion of published literature should be avoided. A separate  
121 Results and Discussion is often appropriate.

123 **4. Conclusions**

124 The main conclusions of the study may be presented in a short Conclusions section, which  
125 may stand alone or form a subsection of a Discussion or Results and Discussion section.

127 **ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS**

128 Acknowledgements contains a list of individuals who provided help during the research (e.g.,  
129 sampling taken, providing language help, writing assistance or proof reading the article, etc.).

131 **REFERENCES**

132 *Citation in text*

133 Please ensure that every reference cited in the text is also present in the reference list (and vice  
134 versa). Any references cited in the abstract must be given in full. Unpublished results and personal  
135 communications are not recommended in the reference list, but may be mentioned in the text

137 *Web references*

138 As a minimum, the full URL should be given and the date when the reference was last accessed. Any  
139 further information, if known (DOI, author names, dates, reference to a source publication, etc.),  
140 should also be given. Web references can be listed separately (e.g., after the reference list) under a  
141 different heading if desired, or can be included in the reference list.

143 *Reference style*

144 References should be arranged first chronologically and then further sorted alphabetically if  
145 necessary.

147 *Examples in the manuscript body:*

148 "...The application of marine bioremediation in Indonesian water is relatively new (Weber et al.,  
149 1994a; Weber et al., 1994b; Heipieper et al., 1995). Biomass estimations were calculated according  
150 to

151 Smith et al. (1986). White et al., (2014) have recently shown ...."

152 " ....Social ecological system is dependence of ecological system and social system....(Adrianto,  
153 2010)."

155 *Example in reference list:*

156 References should be arranged first alphabetically and then further sorted chronologically. One  
157 reference from the same author(s) in the same year must be identified by the letters 'a', 'b', 'c', etc.,  
158 placed after the year of publication.

175 *Additional notes:*  
176 Subdivision - numbered sections  
177 Divide your article into clearly defined and numbered sections. Subsections should be numbered  
178 1.(then 1.1., 1.2., ...), 2, etc. (the abstract is not included in section numbering).

179  
180 **Figure captions:** Ensure that each illustration has a caption. A caption should comprise a brief title  
181 (not on the figure itself) and a description of the illustration. Keep text in the illustrations  
182 themselves to a minimum but explain all symbols and abbreviations used.

183  
184 **Tables:** Number tables consecutively with Arabic numerals in accordance with their appearance in  
185 the text. Avoid vertical rules. Be sparing in the use of tables and ensure that the data presented in  
186 tables do not duplicate results described elsewhere in the article. Tables should never be included  
187 within the text, because file(s) containing tables are attached separately in the electronic  
188 submission system.
